About Us

Jasani Centre for Social Entrepreneurship & Sustainability Management is the social arm of NMIMS. Initially, NMIMS incorporated Social Entrepreneurship Cell in 2003 to institutionalize its social commitment. Subsequently, NMIMS upgraded the Cell's organizational structure as Center for Sustainability Management & Social Entrepreneurship on October 1, 2011. In recognition of the generous endowment extended by Mr. Uday Indukumar Jasani & Mr. Suresh Kantilal Jasani, the Center was renamed as the 'Jasani Centre for Social Entrepreneurship & Sustainability Management' on January 12, 2013.

The vision, mission, and objectives of the Centre are elucidated below:

Vision: To sensitize the students, faculty members, alumni, corporates, and human service organizations to continuously respond to the changing social realities through the development and application of knowledge for creating a sustainable society that protects and promotes dignity, equality social justice, and human rights for all.

Mission: To create a new generation of business leaders and social entrepreneurs who are knowledgeable about and are committed to building a sustainable society

Objectives: The research and the teaching strengths combined with the experiential learning approach and guiding principles of the Center connect sustainability-focused knowledge and research to students, businesses, and civil society organizations.

The Jasani Center's work is divided into the following areas:

- 1. Developing academic programs in Social Entrepreneurship (Diploma/ MBA (part-time) in Social Entrepreneurship)
- 2. Knowledge development and dissemination
- 3. MBA involvement in the social sector
- 4. Facilitating Social Innovations
- 5. Research & Documentation

1. Academic Programs

1.1 Diploma / MBA (part-time) in Social Entrepreneurship

Since 2006, the Jasani Center offers the following weekend programs for the working executives who wish to upgrade their skills in Social Entrepreneurship.

- a) Diploma in Social Entrepreneurship (SE) [Three Trimesters Ten months]
- b) MBA (part-time) in Social Entrepreneurship (SE) [Six Trimesters Two years]

1.2 Current Students

In 2020-21, four students (Two male & two females respectively) completed their Diploma Programme in Social entrepreneurship. The MBA (part-time) results in SE Batch of 2019-21 were declared on April 22, 2021. The batch consisted of 15 students (Eight males & seven female students).

1.4 Scholarships

To enable social sector professionals, complete their aspiration of higher education, the Jasani Centre makes efforts to solicit support from funding agencies and seek need-based scholarships. Currently, the following two scholarships are offered:

a) Mirae Asset Foundation (MAF) Scholarship

Since 2019, Mirae Asset Foundation (MAF) has extended scholarship support to economically backward class students (family income below Eight Lakhs per annum). In the current academic year, MAF granted scholarship support of INR Twelve lakhs to the SE batch (One lakh each to 12 students). *Refer Annexure-II*

b) NMIMS Scholarship

To enable social sector professionals to upgrade their management skillsets, the School of Business Management (SBM), NMIMS, offered need-based scholarships for Diploma/MBA (part-time) students in SE. In all, 20 students from the MBA (part-time) in SE Batch 2021-23 were granted the scholarship. The total amount of the scholarship was INR Twenty-Eight Lakhs Twenty-Five Thousand. *Refer Annexure-III*

2. Knowledge Development & Dissemination

In addition to the academic curriculum inputs, the Center arranged value-added workshops to strengthen the educational base of the students.

2.1 Special Workshops

a) Fundraising workshop

Mr. Roshan D'Souza & Ms. Tej Dhami from Unlimited India conducted a Fundraising workshop on August 28-29, 2020, for the Diploma/MBA (part-time) in SE, the first-year batch.

The workshop highlighted:

1. Fundraising for non-profits and social enterprises

- Know the stages of Problem Solution fit to Business / Program Model Fit stages and its importance in the context of fundraising.

2. Financial Spectrum

- Know the funding landscape trends and opportunities
- Overview of different Funding options and insight into what a range of funders are looking for (available for non-profits and social enterprises)
- Know the pros and cons of each funding option

3. Learn how to Pitch

- Know what is pitching in the context of fundraising at a start-up stage
- Learn a tool/method to pitching for fundraising

4. Learn how to think and act on a fundraising opportunity

- Articulating the need for fundraising: how much do you need to raise and why?
- Learn a tool/method to think about "how to" fundraising planning for your idea/organization.

b) Social Impact Workshop

To develop skills among students to measure social impact, Mr. Kartik Engaleshwaran, Sustainability Expert, conducted a two-day Social Impact Workshop on December 4-5, 2020.

The workshop highlighted:

- 1. Introduction to Social Impact Measurement (SROI), Methodology and Impact Map
- 2. Stakeholder Engagement and Capturing the Social Change
- 3. Formulation of Indicators of Change
- 4. Monetizing the Social Change
- 5. Establishing the Social Impact
- 6. Calculating the Social Impact

c) Disaster Management Workshop

In the context of increasing disasters and their impact on human life, infrastructure, and economy. There is a need to develop skills of social sector professionals in disaster preparedness, mitigation, response, and recovery in reducing the impact of disasters on human life. To equip our students with Disaster Management knowledge and skills, Dr. Paresh Navalkar conducted a two-day workshop on 'Disaster Management and Role of Social Enterprises' on November 27-28, 2020.

The workshop highlighted:

1. Classification of disasters

- 2. Disaster management stages
- 3. Prevention, risk assessment, preparation, training, salvage priorities
- 4. Disaster Management Act 2001
- 5. Developing a disaster plan, disaster response, and recovery
- 6. Role of Social Enterprises

2.2 Seminar Paper / B-Plan / Case Study

Students of the final year MBA (part-time) in SE, Batch 2019-21, Trimester VI, submitted seminar papers in the area of social development. Refer to the list of Seminar Papers in *Annexure-IV*.

In Trimester VII, the students were given the option to write a business plan/ case study in social entrepreneurship. Fifteen students submitted business plans, and one student worked on a case study. (See Annexure-V).

2.3 Seminar / Webinar organized by Jasani Center

a) National Webinar on Future of Social Work

Navrachana University and the National Association of Professional Social Workers in India organized a national webinar on "Future of Social Work" on July 9, 2020. Dr. Meena Galliara, Director, Jasani Centre for Social Entrepreneurship & Sustainability Management, presented her views on Dimensions of 'Globalization & its Impact for Social Work Agencies & Education.' (*See Annexure-VI*)

b) Webinar on Digital Marketing for Alumni of Dip/PTMBA(SE)

To upgrade the skills of alumni and students for Digital Marketing, Ms. Tammana Gupta, Founder, Umashi Marketing and Branding, conducted a webinar on Digital Marketing for Alumni of Diploma/MBA (part-time) in SE on August 8, 2020, and for the Diploma/MBA (part-time) in SE students of the first and second year on September 19, 2020.

The webinar covered the following:

- 1. How to accelerate their sales and marketing engines?
- **2.** How to plan their digital outreach using Google tools?
- **3.** Given that everyone is constrained for cash, learn tips and tricks for free lead generation and build brand awareness.

c) National Webinar on Entrepreneurship as a Panacea to Economic Development during Covid19 Pandemic

Dr. Meena Galliara was invited for a presentation on Social Entrepreneurship on August 14, 2020, at the 'National Webinar on Entrepreneurship as a Panacea to Economic Development during Covid19 Pandemic'. She spoke about the relevance of social entrepreneurship to create social equity and examples of social innovations designed by young adults. She presented the case study of Ms. Chetna Gala, Founder of Mandeshi Mahila Bank, to economically empower women.

d) Discussion on Promoting Industry-Academia Linkages

Prof. Satish Kajjer was invited as a panelist for a discussion on 'Promoting Industry-Academia Linkages.' It was held on October 9, 2020, in partnership with MSME-DI Mumbai, Department of Technical Education-GoM, Maharashtra Economic Development Council (MEDC), and Bombay Chambers of Commerce and Industry (BCCI).

The discussion was on promoting and incentivizing industry-academia linkages in the context of MSMEs in Maharashtra. The objective was to identify best practices with the potential of scaling up. Participants included members from the industry, academia, multilateral agencies, central government, and state government of Maharashtra.

e) Seminar on Becoming an Education-focussed Professor

The British Academy of Management organized an online Seminar on 'Becoming an Education-focussed Professor' on October 28, 2020. Prof. Santana Pathak and Prof. Sujata Mukherjee presented their paper, 'Reflective essay as pedagogy in MBA Education: An inter-disciplinary experiment.' They highlighted that reflective thinking is an important habit which needs to be inculcated among management students to develop insights to make real-world choices in their life as managers. The presentation focussed on how to use reflective thinking as a multi-purpose learning tool in management education.

f) National Level Research Symposium

The Salaam Bombay Foundation and Narotam Sekhsaria Foundation jointly organized the National Level Research Symposium on 'Adolescent health and education during COVID-19 pandemic in India: Challenges and Solutions' on March 12, 2021. (See Annexure-VII)

Dr. Galliara was invited as a panelist for the panel discussion on 'Ensuring Continuity of learning during COVID19 - Research, Innovations, and challenges in Education'. Based on statistical evidence, Dr. Galliara shared that 290 million school-going children were affected in India due to the Pandemic. But, the resilient nature of the human mind helped in innovating new channels of formal and vocational education creatively through the use of technology and local resources. To substantiate her points, she cited examples of 'Treetop' schools in Odhisha, 'School in a Box' by Unicef, Use of loudspeakers in tribal hamlets of India, and use of **ICT** tools like Televisions, Ipads/laptops/desktops/smartphones in urban areas. She cited a couple of case studies to articulate how the organizations had digitized vocational training. Explaining the pros and cons of using technology, she reiterated that going ahead, education and vocational education will be provided in the blended form, which would incorporate the features of online/offline training.

g) Round Table Conference

Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai, invited Dr. Meena Galliara for an online round table conference on April 24, 2021. Faculty who teach Social Welfare Administration (SWA) to the first-year students enrolled in the postgraduate degree

program in social work organized the conference to discuss 'Social Welfare Administration as a Method Course in Social Work Education. Dr. Galliara shared her views and ideas on the topic. The meeting closed with the question-answer session to address the queries.

h) Webinar on Session on Social Entrepreneurship

Institution's Innovation Council (IIC) of Amity University invited Dr. Meena Galliara for a Webinar "Session on Social Entrepreneurship." The half-day event was held on May 27, 2021, to educate students from different streams about the opportunities in the social sector. UG, PG students and doctoral scholars from the areas like Biotechnology, Life Sciences, Management, Engineering. Liberal Arts, Law, and faculty members of Amity University attended the session.

Dr. Meena Galliara guided the participants regarding the opportunities in the social sector, emphasizing students' engagement in social enterprises/initiatives, like the We Care Internship initiated by NMIMS for the MBA students. The webinar concluded with a question-answer session to address the queries of the participants.

3. MBA Involvement in the Social Sector

The Centre actively supports Civic Engagement activities through the curricular and non-curricular mode. The same has been elucidated below:

3.1 We Care: Civic Engagement Internship 2020-21

Civic engagement is an essential component of SBM's program learning objectives. The Jasani Centre for Social Entrepreneurship and Sustainability Management has documented the "We Care: Civic Engagement Internship Report 2021." Due to the Covid19 Pandemic, these internships were executed concurrently between January and March 2021 through virtual/semi-virtual mode. Six hundred forty-three students interned across 231 organizations located in 105 cities of India under the mentorship of 54 faculty mentors.

Students worked on projects aligned with multiple SDGs, comprised of online teaching, developing financial literacy modules, content development, digitizing NGO operations, designing MIS, drafting various organizational policies, reports, carrying out online research on varied subjects, and other related areas. The data highlights that, prominently, 66 percent of projects were aligned with Quality Education (SDG 4), 40 percent with Good Health & Well-being (SDG 3), and 38 percent with Decent Work & Economic Growth (SDG 8). Cumulatively students contributed 1,34,003 hours for the social sector. The feedback data highlighted that 76 per cent of students were highly satisfied with their internship projects despite the virtual mode of internship, and 96 percent found the training of great value.

Students reported that besides experiencing social sensitivity and satisfaction, they gained knowledge about various facets of NGO management, developed insights into different government schemes/policies. They got an opportunity to develop their communication skills and technical skills. About the quality of interns, a little over 1/3rd of internship

organizations rated our students as Excellent, and 45 percent rated them as Good. Photographs below offer you a glimpse of the internship execution. The report documented by Ms. Bhavna Kothari, Ms. Anjalika Gujar, and Dr. Meena Galliara is available on the NMIMS website.

3.2 Social Responsibility Forum (SRF)

Established in 2003, The Social Responsibility Forum (SRF) is the student body of NMIMS that strives to promote social sensitivity among MBA students by executing various short-term and long-term civic engagement activities. The social activities undertaken by the SRF team are listed below-

SPLASH:



'SPLASH, Your Belief, Our Canvas!', a limn competition where students depict their dedication to a social cause in the form of creative artwork. It was held on September 1, 2020. The theme was 'My COVID Super Hero.' SRF received a participation of 133 students from both first and second-year students. The participants were evaluated based on creativity and relevance to the theme. Winners were awarded prizes worth INR 10,000. SRF thanked all

those superheroes who sacrificed their safety and took care of people.

OLD AGE E-VISIT

The Old Age home e-visit was intended to bring about a memorable day in the lives of the elderly who were not fortunate enough to spend the years with their children. This year, the SRF team virtually visited NGO Swarag and Radhika Old Age Home over a zoom call on September 21 and 23, 2020. It was an amazing experience for the batch to interact with the children.

PROJECT ROSHNI:

SRF, in collaboration with Rotaract Club, Bombay MidTown, launched Project Roshni on Tuesday, November 3, 2020. On the occasion of Diwali, the students convey their kind appreciation and heartfelt wishes to soldiers of the Indian Army in the form of unique messages/poems/artwork, which is printed and sent along with *diyas*. The event was a success as the soldiers celebrated their Diwali with smiles and hearts full of happiness. The volunteers



who participated in the event were delighted to share their messages and thank their heroes. Times of India published this unique initiative on November 27, 2020.

ORPHANAGE E-VISIT

SRF organized an **orphanage e-visit** to Satkarman Ashram from Thane, Mumbai, on Tuesday, November 10, 2020, and Sunaayy Foundation on Wednesday, November 11, 2020. The NGOs work towards providing education to children coming from families of daily wage laborers and underprivileged backgrounds. The event was a success as both the children and the volunteers returned with smiles and hearts full of happiness.



SECRET SANTA

For the festive season, SRF was proud to present the students of NMIMS with a unique platform to do so through the Secret Santa 2020 organized on December 13 and 14, 2020. The students indeed spread the cheer and joy of Christmas by fulfilling the wishes of 250 kids under the protective wing of an NGO named Sunaayy Foundation. The participation from the batch was genuinely heart-warming.



NGO MELA:

Under the mega event "A December to Remember," SRF organized NGO Mela 2020 on the Facebook platform. The week-long event started on December 19 and ended on December 24, 2020. The event witnessed participation from Kshitij, Humari Pehchaan, Mata Bhagwanti Chadha Niketan, Arpana's Devotion, Saheli World, Creative Handicrafts, and Srujna NGOs. Festival to boost the visibility of NGOs by providing them a marketplace to sell their products and promote the causes they work for. A marketing competition is also conducted to help increase the sales proceeds for the NGO. The overall sale of the NGO Mela has amounted to a whopping INR 2.42 lac.

MARATHON:

Continuing its legacy, SRF organized its flagship event, 'Marathon,' from January 29 to 30, 2021. The theme for this year was 'Body Positivity. More than 300 participants covered a total distance of 1533 km. There were around 1467 views on the video post. In all, an event bonded everyone together for a great cause.

SADBHAVNA:

Sadbhavna is the flagship event conducted by the Social Responsibility Forum, SBM, NMIMS. This year, Sadbhavna'20 featured two events- Samadhaan and Vagyuddha.

Samadhaan is an innovative case study challenge for B-schools across India. In association with Repos Energy India Pvt. Ltd., the case study was launched on February 24, 2021. The case was based on implementing an efficient fuel delivery system to reduce the carbon footprint in India. Participating teams had eight days to submit their solutions. Out of 150+ participating teams, ten teams were declared as National finalists. They presented their solutions in the virtual campus round on March 7, 2021. Team MAD Hatters from the Indian Institute of Management (IIM), Ahmedabad, bagged the first position. Team Blueprint from the National Institute of Industrial Engineering (NITIE), Mumbai, and Team JuggerNauts from Narsee Monjee Institute of Management Studies (NMIMS), Mumbai, were declared first and second runner ups respectively. There were cash prizes worth INR 55,000 and inkind prizes worth more than INR 2,00,000.

Vagyuddha, a social parliamentary debate, was launched for all B-schools across India on February 24, 2021. All the 24 registered participants had to write an article both for and against the motion on the topic- 'Carbon Tax- Should governments impose it or not?'. The campus round was on March 7, 2021, via Zoom. There were Cash Prizes worth more than INR 25,000 and in-kind prizes worth more than INR 2,00,000. Team Blitzkrieg secured the first position, followed by Team IRNA GHURLS and Team Telepathy, who secured second and third positions.

4. Research and Publications

The Center makes an effort to publish research papers and document Field-based Anthologies. A brief description of the same is provided below:

4.1 We Care Anthology

We Care Anthology - Samvit Lessons from the Field

We Care Anthology 2021 Volume VIII – Samvit: Lessons from the Field is an outcome of the experiences gained by the students during their We Care Civic Engagement Internship 2020. The Anthology covers seven articles authored by 11 students, specifically related to SDG 3 – Good Health and Well-being and SDG 8 – Decent Work and Economic Growth. The articles attempt to describe the challenges faced by the disabled, the ultra-poor, trafficked women, and the citizens at large. The stories of change will inspire readers to appreciate the efforts taken by the NGOs to facilitate social transformation and empowerment.

The Anthology, edited by Dr. Meena Galliara & Ms. Bhawna Kothari, was published on January 13, 2021, NMIMS University Day. Refer to SBM, NMIMS website for detailed reading of the Anthology.

4.2 Papers Published

The challenges of the redevelopment of an old and dilapidated building in Mumbai: A policy perspective

M K Satish (2020). The challenges of the redevelopment of old and dilapidated building in Mumbai: A policy perspective, *Critical Housing Analysis*, Vol 7, Issue 2, pp 36-46

Abstract: Affordable housing is the biggest challenge faced by Mumbai, which styles itself as an emerging Global Financial Centre. The city has the image of being home to a stark dualism, with slums abutting modern skyscrapers. Over the years, adequate policy attention has been given to slums. With the implementation of the Slum Rehabilitation Scheme, slum dwellers are being provided with housing in multi-storey buildings and are being granted tenancy rights to the dwellings. However, an emerging area of concern is the large housing stock that is non-slum but is old and dilapidated. The collapse of an old and dilapidated building in Dongri in July 2019 that killed twelve people and the one at Bhendi Bazaar in 2017 that killed thirty-three has brought this problem into the mainstream. New policies have been initiated to address the issue. Implementing these policies seems to be a challenge, and this is the result of different factors. This article looks at the housing problem in Mumbai from a policy perspective and analyses the implementation challenges of the new policy aimed at redeveloping the old and dilapidated housing stock.

Entrepreneurial ecosystem and social entrepreneurship: case studies of community-based craft from Kutch, India

Abstract: Are disabled people indeed included in Indian society? This is a question that needs to acquire even greater thrust in the wake of the COVID-19 Pandemic, where "health" per se has become a wild goose chase even for the abled. The first part provides conceptual clarity to the definition and perspectives of disability and a brief description of the disability scenario at the global and national levels. An overview of the disability rights movements, legal provisions, and policy measures adopted by the government to change the focus from disability to facilitate

inclusion is presented in the ensuing part. This is followed by a discussion on the assessment of disability inclusion. The paper ends with an analysis of the inclusion assessment measures, a conclusion, and what could be the road ahead.

Spearheaded by Shalini Datta, the organization provides livelihood support to urban slums in Mumbai to design sustainable, handcrafted art products. Scaling from three women in 2013 to forty women in 2021, Aftertaste's model focused on creating social impact and strived to generate revenue through sales of handmade items to corporate and retail buyers. For six years, Shalini incubated her business model with the support of the Avanti Foundation. After she gathered enough field experience, she registered Aftertaste as a not–for–profit entity in September 2019. As the economy gradually 'restarted' post lockdown, AfterTaste Foundation struggled to maintain financial sustainability. Shalini was perturbed by the uncertainty of the Pandemic and unsure how she could
		continue creating social impact in the lives of more women.
